
Annual General Meeting (AGM)

Ant's fundraising tops £35,000



Ant Liquorish held his 40th charity quiz at the Village Hall Annex on 21 April, raising £267 for the English Contact Karate Association (ECKA) in Kingsthorpe. This voluntary organisation provides martial arts training to children of all ages, especially teenagers, offering them a safe haven where they learn discipline, self control, respect for themselves and their community.

ECKA Secretary Liz Watkins said: "I would like to thank Ant for organising and running yet another superb quiz and for the kind donation to our club. Thanks too to the 13 teams (80 people) who took part, to everyone who helped out on the night and the local stores, pubs and restaurants that donated nearly £200 of raffle prizes".

Over the 20 years that Ant has been running the quizzes, he's researched and posed some 5,000 questions and his events have raised an incredible £35,000 for charity.

Ant's next charity quiz, which will mark his 20 year anniversary, takes place on 20 October in aid of the Alzheimer's Society. Put the date in your diaries.

Middleton Parish Council News from Dryden Phillipson

Work is progressing well on the old orchard restoration project, although the recent heavy rain has brought a pause in activities! The next steps are to level the site, lay paths, install benches and when in full leaf, prune the fruit trees and remove that vigorous ivy. The new fence will have espalier fruit trees and shrubs planted along its length with wild flowers planted to attract insects. We'd like to hear from anyone who may have an old local variety of apple or pear tree growing in their garden for grafting or budding into the orchard.

Allotments and 'grow your own' have increased in popularity in recent years and we'd like to know from residents how much support there is for locally sited allotments.

Dog fouling continues to be a problem and we are asking our local school children to help design a poster that can be used in the village to deter it. A high profile campaign is planned to tackle this anti-social problem, with Corby Borough Council's Neighbourhood Warden supporting us with the power to levy on-the-spot fines to offenders.

Tackling the ongoing speeding traffic problem, we're pleased to have had assurance from the Police that a hand-held speed detection gun will be deployed in Middleton by a Police Community Support Officer at least weekly.

Cottingham Parish Council - a look back at the year

The Chairman's Report and 2010/11 Accounts were the two main topics on the agenda at April's Annual Parish Meeting. Here's a short extract from Chairman Pete Bowman's report. You can download the full version from the Cottingham Parish Council website at **www.cottingham.org.uk/news.html**. The accounts will also be available online mid-July once they've been audited.

"The last 12 months have seen the resolution of some issues, the continuation of others and new issues to challenge us in the future.

"The unauthorised stables development on Rockingham Road was resolved quickly and, by October, the site had been returned to its previous state. The temporary planning permission granted to Little Meadow expired in February and was followed by a new, permanent planning application. The Parish Council chose not to support the new application and we are currently awaiting the decision of Corby's Development Control Committee.



"Our Parish Council continues to work towards Quality Council status and, following meetings at the end of 2011, we have been advised that we are 'well on our way' to becoming one of just 12 Quality Parish Councils in the county. Part of the criteria has been the production and adoption of our Community Engagement Strategy, our Training Statement and our Welcome Pack. The Welcome Pack itself, which was completed in its first version in May, has been recognised by other parish and town councils in the region who have asked if they could use it as a template for their own Welcome Packs.

"I'd like to thank my fellow councillors and those in the 'back room' - Tree Warden Jon Dixon, Footpaths Warden Diana Sharvill, Speedwatch Co-ordinator Mike Curtis, Cllrs Bob Riley and Stan Heggs, newsletter editor Jane Smith and PCSO Mark Tooley - who, collectively, have helped make this another successful year.

"Thank you all once again and I look forward to another good year next year."
