# St Mary Magdalene Church Survey

Following the recent departure of Rev Sian Reading, Cottingham Parochial Church Council (PCC) has agreed to a Deanery proposal to enlarge their benefice to seven parishes covering Ashley, Cottingham, East Carlton, Stoke Albany, Sutton Bassett, Weston-by-Welland and Wilbarston. This enlarged benefice will be served by a full time Rector.

The service pattern of our churches hasn't changed for many years, and this, together with the enlargement of the benefice, means the existing pattern is not sustainable for a single full time priest, and will need to change. Before a new priest is appointed, the PCC is carrying out a survey of villagers to find out, in particular, what services you'd like to attend, but also what you want from the church as a village asset.

# Remembering our fallen soldiers

There are 24 WW1 soldiers commemorated on the Memorial and also four soldiers from WW2. One of these is **Flight Lt Bertram** (Bert) Townsin of the 29th Squadron Royal Air Force



Volunteer Reserve who died on 23 February 1944. We remember Bert and all the other soldiers who gave their lives for us.

# Vehicle crime alert

Towards the end of October, there were a number of incidents involving a group of men seen trying car door handles in Middleton. Some items were stolen from vehicles and one keyless entry car was stolen from a driveway. These incidents all happened around 1am, although this isn't to say there's not a risk at other times of the day or night. Also towards the end of October, we were made aware of a spate of break-ins / attempted break-ins to vans in Cottingham and the surrounding villages to steal tools.

Please be vigilant in locking your house and car and removing contents that might make it a target. Police advice is to keep your car keys, and all keys, in a safe place away from your door, as some car keys can now be cloned from a short distance through your door.

If you notice any suspicious behaviour which concerns you, please report it to the Police with a vehicle registration number if you have one. All incidents, whether with cars or your home, however large or small, should be reported to the Police by calling 101 or, if it's an emergency and a theft is in progress, call 999. Remember if it's not reported, it can't be solved if thieves are targeting our village.

Cottingham School has come top in a Corby Library reading challenge. Sixty children took part in the challenge to read at least six books each over the summer break, double the number taking part in 2018. This placed the school top for the second year running, with the children reading at least 360 books between them.

Head teacher Ashley Scott said: "This is an amazing achievement, especially as we are only a small school of 130 pupils. We do all we can to promote a love of reading, both at school and at home, and we have a great relationship with Corby Library. This achievement really shows how well the school is supported by the parents, and the important part that reading plays in the children's learning."

### Cottingham Parish Council update from David Grayson, Chair



**Parish Clerk retires.** Cottingham Parish Clerk Peter Taylor has retired after over 33 years of service. The Council was founded in 1894, meaning Peter has been Clerk for over a quarter of the Council's 125 year existence! He has been a safe pair of hands, as you'd expect from a former Hull City goalkeeper. We'd like to thank Peter for his hard work, dedication and assistance over the years, wish him good luck in his retirement and thank him for being the thoroughly nice man we've all come to respect.

**Neighbourhood Plan.** There is still work to be done obtaining the evidence required to produce Cottingham's Neighbourhood Plan, and we need more help from people in the village. Remember that, once accepted, the Plan will be the primary planning document for the village. Planning authorities are obliged to use a Neighbourhood Plan as a primary source of evidence when it makes decisions relating to green spaces, future housing, house extensions and a host of other aspects affecting village life.

**Overhanging shrubbery.** A number of residents have contacted us about overhanging shrubbery at shoulder and head height restricting use of the pavements. We kindly urge homeowners with gardens running along pavements in the village, especially on Corby Road, Rockingham Road, High Street and School Lane, to keep their gardens cut back so pedestrians can use the full width of the pavement. # Dog mess (yet again)

Despite several pieces in this newsletter about dog mess, it seems that some people either don't listen, don't care or remain too selfish to clean up after their dog. The school has been in touch to say that parents have raised concerns about the amount of dog poo on the recreation field – one child has had the misfortune of treading in a pile three times. And villagers have also taken to Facebook to complain about the increase in poop around the villages, particularly around Darescroft/Ashley Road, on the path up to The Dale, and even on someone's driveway!

Dog mess is an eyesore and a health hazard. If you're a dog owner, you have a legal duty to clean up if your dog messes in a public place. Failure to do so carries a maximum fine of  $\pm 1,000$ .

The recreation field is a public place. The path up to the Dale may be classed as rural land, but even so, please be considerate and either bag and bin your poo, or get a stick and flick it into the undergrowth – don't leave it for people to step in.

If you spot someone letting their dog foul in a public place without cleaning it up, please report it to Corby Borough Council on **01536 464000** with as much information as possible, such as the time, date and location of the incident, the frequency (if it happens regularly), a description/breed of dog, a description of the owner and, if known, their name and address.


