

The recent Cottingham Village Fete attracted a record number of visitors and raised a fantastic £3,427 for the school and church.

On a glorious summer's day, visitors came along to enjoy a range of attractions, all provided by community volunteers, including live music, miniature train rides, face painting, a beer tent, tea room and barbecue and the Pets Cuddle Corner from West Lodge Farm Park. There were lots of games and stalls, including a very cuddly teddy bear stall run by Sue Beadsworth and the ever popular 'made in the village' stall selling locally crafted gifts and toys.

Fete organiser Angela Preston-Jones said: "We are all delighted with how well the fete went this year. We had more games, more attractions, more visitors and a brilliant atmosphere. It was the busiest yet and we are so grateful to all those people who gave their time and skills to help us make the day enjoyable and profitable."

The school will use the money raised to buy musical instruments, starting with guitars, so that more children have the opportunity to learn an instrument, and the church will use the funds to repair the church path.

Youngsters get on board for village skate park

The Recreation Ground Working Group, alongside HAGS play company, spoke with young people and residents about the proposed new skate park scheme at the recent village fete. They collected 40 questionnaires, which asked people about construction materials, design and preferred layout. Together with the online survey carried out earlier this year and village survey activity in 2012, the team now has more than 100 responses to inform the project.

Most respondents placed a skate park as their first or second choice in terms of preferred additional facilities for young people in the village. The working group will now look at the results and the next step will be to set up a young persons' action group, which will assist with developing a final design and organising local fundraising efforts. The working group will also start to look at potential funding sources for the bulk of the project.

LPUK is a charity providing help, friendship and support for people in the UK with a restricted growth condition. The children presented Warwick, who is patron of the charity, and his wife Sammy, the charity's Chairperson, with a cheque for £137, which was raised at a recent charity day at the school. LPUK was nominated by 8-year old Elliot Dee in support of his younger brother Bruce (aged 7), who has the restricted growth condition 'Achondroplasia'.

Star Wars and Harry Potter star Warwick spent an hour at the school, talking to the children about his life and

career, and answering their questions. He said: "As patron of Little People UK, I would like to thank Cottingham Primary School for their amazing fundraising work. I am delighted that LPUK were chosen as a beneficiary and I know the money raised will go a long way to helping people with dwarfism."

Two other charities benefited from the school's charity day - children's charity Spurgeons and Rainbows Hospice for children and young people. Each received donations for £137.



Humf surprised the children of Willow Class with an end of term visit to thank them for taking part in a Chatterbox Challenge earlier this year, where they were sponsored to sing nursery rhymes to raise money for ICAN. The children, aged 4 and 5, raised £285.90 for the charity and also won first prize in the charity's prize draw, winning £500 of educational supplies and, unbeknown to the children, a visit from Humf. School head teacher Emma Tayler said: "This was a wonderful surprise for the children – the look on their faces was an absolute picture! It will

be a day they'll remember for some time and it certainly makes all the effort they put into the Chatterbox Challenge worthwhile."

Update on proposed development to rear of Bury Close

From Cottingham and Middleton Parish Councils

- In June, Corby Borough Council (CBC) received the landscape and layout plans they had requested prior to making a decision on the application. In these plans, the number of houses on the site has been reduced from 75 to 57. CBC has received some responses from statutory consultees on these plans. Northamptonshire Wildlife Trust and the Ramblers Association continue to object to the application and Northamptonshire County Council Highways have also lodged an objection on the grounds of unsuitable access through Bury Close and the impact on walkers' enjoyment of the Jurassic Way. These consultee responses are now available on the Cottingham and Middleton website.
- CBC has been waiting for an archaeological report, which has just been received, and an ecology report, which is expected any time now. The next steps are for CBC to consult with the County Archaeologist and English Heritage on the archaeological report, and with the Wildlife Trust and Northants Bat Group on the ecology report.
- All these documents are (or will soon be) available on CBC's website and you are
 welcome to comment on them at any stage up until a decision is made on the
 application. Keep an eye on the village website for the latest information.

Cottingham Apple Day Recreation Field



'Green Horizons' are organising an Apple Day to celebrate our local countryside and raise money for the charity, which is setting up a horticultural project in Cottingham for children with autism and their families.

Apple Day was launched in 1990 by a national organisation called Common Ground, and communities across the country have since adopted the idea as a way of celebrating the richness and importance of local landscape and culture.

There will be performances from the Rutland Morris Men, and the National Trust will be coming along with information and activities based on Northamptonshire apple growing and bee keeping. Stamford Community Orchard is loaning its cider press and our own local cider man, Mark Shirley from Rockingham Forest Cider, will be on hand to show us how it's done.

Rockingham Castle Tearoom is donating pork and apple baps, and lots of Green Horizons supporters will be baking cakes and apple treats for the teas which will be served by helpers from St Mary Magdalene Church. A Green Horizons Apple Book with recipes and children's drawings will also be on sale.

Green-fingered gardeners are bringing autumn plants and making chutneys, crafts and produce to sell on the day, alongside traditional stalls and activities for children and families

Green Horizons chairman Jan Mears says there has been a terrific response from people who want to get involved: "We wanted to organise a day with some serious messages about the traditions of the countryside and the importance of locally grown food. But we wanted it to be a lot of fun as well. Since we started talking about our plans, we have felt a real buzz from people bringing ideas and offers of support. It should be a fantastic day!"

There will also be a competition for the best scarecrow. Please bring your scarecrow down to the recreation field before 12.30pm. It must be less than 1.5 metres high and able to stand up on its own.
