Rural Police Update

From Acting Sergeant Julie Mead, Corby Rural SCT

The priorities that the Rural Safer Community Team (SCT) focus on are decided by the local Rural Area Forum which includes representatives from local Parish Councils, including Cottingham and Middleton.

Speeding has been highlighted as your main concern and, by now, I'm sure most of you have seen us in the parishes with our new speed gun. We've been working very hard to reduce speeding through our villages. We've taken readings from over 1,100 vehicles and only 38 have been over the speed limit. Of these, 30 drivers have been issued with warning letters for minor breaches and eight have received fines/points or alternative penalties. I would like to think people are beginning to realise we are in the villages and will be enforcing the limits, so hopefully the message that only careful and considerate drivers are welcome in our parishes is sinking in.

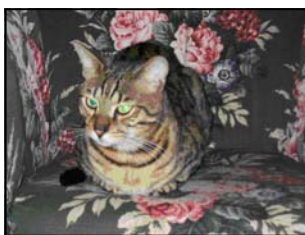
Parking has also been highlighted as a priority issue, mainly around schools. In Cottingham, the Hunting Lodge has kindly given permission for parents to use their car park when dropping off and picking up and I would urge you to take up this offer. The schools are working with us on the parking problem so expect to hear from your children soon!

Parking on pavements has also been highlighted. To make the position on this clear, it is not an offence in itself to park on the pavement but it is an offence to park in such a way that you are causing an obstruction - either to the pavement (you must leave enough room for a double buggy or a disabled carriage to pass) or blocking a driveway.

There has also recently been another distraction burglary on an elderly resident in the area. If you are a neighbour of an elderly resident please keep a watch for unexpected callers and, if you see anything suspicious or unusual, please call the police.

Cottingham Methodist Church Anniversary: 1808 to 2008

Cottingham Methodist Church celebrates its 200th Anniversary this year. The original Methodist Church (now the Methodist Hall) was built on Corby Road in 1808 on land belonging to John and Mary Stretton. Before the chapel was built, worshippers used to meet in the Stretton's home and then, as numbers grew, in a nearby barn. Believe it or not, the Stretton's actually moved out of their house into an adjacent property so that the first chapel could be built on the site in 1808.

The present larger chapel was added alongside in 1878 and, at the opening, it is recorded that the church was so full people were sitting on the steps up to the gallery which housed the choir and harmonium. Near to the pulpit were pews for poorer members of the congregation who the steward would not approach for any collection.



The Methodist choir continued for over 100 years with its heyday in the 1930s and '40s when its ranks were boosted by new members who had arrived in Corby to work at the steelworks.

At one time over 100 children attended the Methodist Sunday School. On August Bank Holidays, the children were taken on a tour of the six neighbouring villages in open wagons - originally horse drawn and later pulled by lorry - led on their way by the Cottingham Wesleyan Brass Band. The day finished with a feast at the Methodist Hall followed by competitive sports on a field near the old clothing factory on Rockingham Road. This annual event, commonly known as 'Round in the Wagons', continued until the outbreak of war in 1939.

The brass band played an important part at all social functions in the village for over 60 years. One of their last public engagements was on Coronation Day in 1953 when, after

a tour of Cottingham and Middleton, they played for dancing at the school. Soon after this, several younger members were called up for National Service and others left to go to college so the band was unfortunately unable to continue.

Over the years, the Methodist Church has hosted youth clubs, sewing circles and the Girl's Brigade to name but a few. The Wesley Guild, formed in 1946, continues today with 15 members.
