## Planning and Development



### Land to rear of Cottingham Hall

The outline planning application for the proposed development of 90 homes on land to the rear of Cottingham Hall has now been submitted to the planning authority (Corby Borough Council) and is currently waiting to be processed. When the application has been registered, villagers will have 21 days to submit their views.

### Installation of Mobile Home - Land at top of Corby Road

Corby Borough Council's planning department advise that 'a few hundred' letters have been received in relation to this planning application. The application is currently being processed.

## Annexe Refurbishment Takes Shape



The refurbishment of the Village Hall Annexe is now well underway, with work expected to be completed by the end of February 2006.

The 12-week scheme involves the removal of the existing showers, changing rooms and bar to give the new-look Annexe a larger main hall, a smaller meeting room, kitchen facilities and a disabled toilet.

The work will cost just over £38,000 (including VAT) with £5,000 having been raised by the Village Hall

Management Committee (VHMC) through various functions and events, £10,910 coming from Northamptonshire County Council and £19,500 from Grantscape, formerly known as Shanks First.

## Cottingham Parish Plan: Initial Results

Analysis of the Cottingham village questionnaires is now well underway with 214 household questionnaires (representing 56% of homes), 366 individual adult questionnaires (representing 48% of village adults) and 33 youth questionnaires having been received.

The Steering Group's initial analysis reveals that speeding and inconsiderate parking are by far the biggest issues for villagers, with concern over inappropriate development coming in third. Village hall and associated facilities are the fourth biggest issue, with the condition and maintenance of the village's roads and pavements fifth. Dog fouling is the sixth biggest issue, with 39% of villagers saying it is a major problem and a further 51% saying it is a slight problem.

These initial findings from the questionnaires have now been shared with Cottingham Parish Council and the full analysis will be completed by the end of the year. The next step will then be for the Steering Group to meet together with the Parish Council in the New Year to talk through the findings and agree an action plan to address the issues raised.

### Neighbourhood Watch and Crime Update

In October and November, there were two attempted break-ins to garages in Cottingham, and one house burglary.

Northamptonshire Police also report an increase in the number of cars being stolen in the county using keys stolen from the owner's property. In some cases, an attractive vehicle parked on the driveway is leading to a burglary being carried out to find keys. Advice from the Police is to keep car keys safe at all times, well away from the front door and out of sight of windows. However, never take your keys with you to bed.

A Neighbourhood Watch scheme is now up and running in Welland View Road, co-ordinated by Bob Riley. Schemes are also in place for Rockingham Road and Stonepit Drive.

# Not Forgotten....

If you've been watching any of the recent TV programmes about the First World War, you can't fail to have been both fascinated and moved by the real life stories of the people who fought, lived and died during the Great War. But have you ever wondered at the stories behind the men commemorated on the Cottingham and Middleton war memorial?



War memorials first sprang up after the 1914-18 War to provide a focal point for families to remember their loved ones who'd died and been buried overseas.

One of the 23 First World War soldiers remembered on the village memorial is **Omar Tilley**. His great nephew David Tilley (pictured left), now living in Cleethorpes, tells us that Omar was an acting sergeant in the Leicester Regiment and a holder of the military medal. He died of his wounds in December 1917 aged 23, most probably during the German counter offensive at Cambrai, and is buried in the British Commonwealth war graves at Abbeville Communal Cemetery Extension in France.

The war memorial was also recently visited by Margery Haseler and her family who have traced their ancestors back to Cottingham. Margery's uncle **John Dunkley**, of the Royal Engineers' Reinforcements, died in Basra, Iraq in July 1916, aged 26 and his younger brother **Harry Dunkley**, of the Royal Warwickshire Regiment, died a few weeks later in the Somme, aged just 17.

Channel 4 is currently compiling a database of the First World War memorials and those they commemorate at [www.channel4.com/lostgeneration](http://www.channel4.com/lostgeneration). The Cottingham and Middleton memorial is listed and the database also includes a memorial plaque at Cottingham and Middleton School erected 'in memory of the old boys of the school who fell in the Great World War 1914-1918'.

Whilst all our village pubs and the Hunting Lodge have been granted longer opening hours, all say that these longer hours will be used sparingly, for special occasions and to allow flexibility.
