

Police update

'Operation Trebuchet', launched by Northants Police following a spate of break-ins to business premises in the villages and across Corby towards the end of last year, has led to the arrest and charging of three men – Stephen Hill (31) and Ross Laird (39), both of no fixed address, and Peter Tierney (37) of Waver Close, Corby.

Cottingham Parish Council update from David Grayson, Chair

New Councillors

The Parish Council now has a full complement of Councillors. We welcome Sarayou Thomas-George, and Luke Montague who is set to join at our next meeting.

Neighbourhood Plan

We are about to start developing the Neighbourhood Plan for Cottingham. The Parish Council has agreed to hire a company of consultants which has helped a number of local parishes to successfully complete their Neighbourhood Plans. Funding for the consultants is to be obtained through a grant, so there shouldn't be any additional cost to precept payers.

Public footpath across golf range

There is a public footpath that crosses the golf range at the top of Corby Road. The finger post is being damaged on a regular basis and all attempts to secure the sign have failed to stop the perpetrators. This path is a public right of way and walkers should not be discouraged from using it. We have contacted the club's owners and will continue to pursue this matter with them. If anyone has had problems using this path, please get in touch with us. We would be interested to hear from you.

Other matters

Some of the other issues the Parish Council is working on are damage to the unadopted pathway leading to the Royal George from Corby Road, a survey of trees in the village, the state and ownership of grit bins and damage caused to the grass verges by Anglian Water.

Dog mess (yet again)

We've had more reports in recently about an increase in dog mess on Church Street. Please pick up after your dog and take it home with you, or put it in one of the collection bins. There is one at the bottom of the Church steps.

Also, please be considerate if you're walking your dog in The Dale or along the footpaths in the adjacent fields. Don't leave your dog's mess on or near the footpaths for people to tread in. Bag and bin it, or at the very least get a stick and flick it into the undergrowth. This is especially important if there is livestock in the fields, as dog mess can be hazardous to sheep and cattle if ingested, leading to miscarriages, illness and even death.

All snug at The Spread

The Spread Eagle has converted its bar area into a cosy family and dog friendly snug, complete with open fire. There's a range of bar style snack platters available and even free Scooby snacks for your pooch!

A full menu is available in the lounge with Steak Nights on Wednesdays (2 for £15), Sunday lunch being served (booking essential) and a seniors lunch available from 12-3pm Wednesday to Saturday (£7.95 for 2 courses and £9.95 for 3 courses). And don't forget it's guiz night every Thursday, live music on the first Saturday of the month and disco/karaoke on the last Saturday. The pub is closed on Mondays.

A soldier's tale

Hundreds of villagers turned out to the War Memorial for the Remembrance Service and the commemoration event that followed in the Village Hall Annex on 11 November, to mark the centenary of the end of the First World War.



The organisers would like to thank everyone who came along and helped out with the event, including the Valley Voice Choir and all the musicians who gave their time freely.

The main focus of the day was to remember the brave soldiers from the villages who gave their lives for us, and Ray and Shauna Barnett were particularly interested in the story of John Dunkley, whose name they'd found etched on the window of the utility room at their home on The Hill, Middleton (next to the Red Lion).

After a bit of investigating, it turns out that John and his family lived in this house in 1901 but that by 1911 John, a younger

brother, and their mother Mary had moved to the Almshouses in East Carlton. Mary's husband, a carpenter on the East Carlton Estate, had died in 1904 and, as the etching is dated December 1906 (when John would have been around 20), could it be that he left his mark as the family were leaving the house? Sadly, less than 10 years later in July 1916, John died while serving in Iraq, just three months after his little brother Harry had been killed on the Western Front.


