Ruth passes her century!

Ruth Harrison of Berryfield Road, Cottingham, celebrated a true milestone on Boxing Day when she reached her 102nd birthday!

Born Ruth Blissett in Wilbarston in 1917, Ruth's father was an ironstone labourer who she says worked extremely hard and gave them a good life growing up.

Ruth left school at 14 and went to work as a seamstress at Symingtons in Market Harborough, where she cycled to work every day before moving to a corset factory in Desborough.

Ruth married Cottingham-born John William (Jack)
Harrison in 1941 and moved to the village, taking a job making clothes at the Wallis and Linnell factory on Rockingham Road. The couple lived in Blind Lane for 11 years before moving to one of the 11 cottages in Barrack Yard, which used to run between Corby Road and Blind Lane. These cottages had no inside toilets or hot water, and Ruth remembers that her rent was eight shillings a week – that's 96 pence in today's money!

"They were nice days and I have some happy memories," said Ruth. "We were like a big family. Everyone looked out for each other and you could ask for anything. We also had a clothing club and a sick club that we paid into,



75 years on – lest we forget

In our last newsletter, we remembered Flight Lt Bertram Townsin, one of four WW2 soldiers commemorated on the village War Memorial.

As we head towards the 75th anniversary of VE Day, we remember another of our fallen WW2 soldiers, John (known as Jack) Campbell, of Middleton Main Street. Jack was only 25 when, on 24 October

1941, he was tragically knocked down by a motor coach in Freckleton, Preston and suffered a fractured skull. An inquest returned a verdict of 'death by misadventure'. Thanks to Jack's niece Sally Pashley for sending us this photo and sharing his story.

Parish Council elections, Thursday 7 May

Elections for both Parish Councils will take place on 7 May (if there are more people standing than there are seats), the same day as elections for the new Unitary Authority.

David Grayson, Chair of Cottingham Parish Council, says: "This is an important time for the village. We have a new Unitary Authority on the horizon and Cottingham is close to having a Neighbourhood Plan, both of which will potentially shape the village for some time to come. We're hoping enough people are interested in becoming a councillor to generate an election, so residents can vote on who they want to take the village forward." Sarah Brant, Chair of Middleton Parish Council, says: "Our seven existing councillors are all prepared to stand again in May, but some would also consider standing down if any other residents are interested and able to take on the role and responsibilities of councillor. If you'd like to represent your community, either as a councillor or in a less formal capacity, please contact Justina Medwell (email opposite). She'll let you know what it entails and how to apply."

Spread Eagle car park planning application refused

The planning application submitted by William Masson and Thomas Southall to erect a house on the Spread Eagle car park (reference 18/00617/DPA) was refused by Corby Borough Council's Development Control Committee on 11 February. Councillors had made a site visit earlier in the day and the decision was made by a majority of 4 to 3, with 1 councillor abstaining.



At the meeting, Owen Davison raised his objections and Sarayou George did the same on behalf of Cottingham Parish Council. "I am pleased Corby Council has given us a voice," said Sarayou. "The area is already congested and if permission was granted it would have impacted on the pub which we want to see thrive."

Cllr David Sims, who recommended the refusal principally on highways grounds, also said that, if built, the house would affect the viability of the drinking venue and have a detrimental effect on the conservation area.

The applicants still have the right to appeal against this decision.

Ralph Turner (1948 to 2020)

Ralph Turner sadly passed away on 25 January, aged 71.

Ralph was born in Co. Durham and he and his wife Ann lived just doors away from each other. They then lived in Nuneaton with children Victoria and Colin before moving to Middleton after Ralph had stumbled on the new Glover Court development while out on a Sunday drive. He soon had his garden looking beautiful, especially the roses which blossomed under his care. Ralph also tended a number of local gardens until his illness stopped him carrying on.

"Ralph was a loving husband and father who will be dearly missed, a wonderful man who touched the hearts of so many, including his carers in his final months," said Ann. "May you be forever at peace and walk among the roses in heaven."

Barry Lonsdale (1951 to 2019)

Barry Lonsdale sadly passed away on 28 November, aged 68. He had lived in Berryfield Road for many years and his wife Pam had lived in the village even longer, her family all coming from the Cottingham 'Jacksons'. Barry's family would like to say a massive thank you to the Spread Eagle for opening up specially for the wake following Barry's funeral on 9 December. "They provided a great buffet, lovely food and excellent service," said Barry's daughter Jo, "and keeping it local meant so much. We'd also like to thank all our friends, family and neighbours for their condolences and support during this difficult time."







Update From The Mill

From Chair of Trustees, Pete Bowman

"Work on the Mill project is progressing well and we've been consulting with building industry professionals to fine tune our 'design



and build' construction costings. We'd like to thank all the local and national businesses that have already given us valuable advice and support to help move the project forward. As it stands, we're looking to start initial groundworks by August 2020, as the first phase of the construction programme.

"We are also constantly amazed (and humbled) by the amount of effort and enthusiasm that villagers have put into raising money for the project. The 'thank you' list would take quite a while to write out, but be assured you have the Trustees' heartfelt appreciation for all the important work you do, both in arranging events and behind the scenes."

Since the last newsletter, villagers have raised almost £3,000 for The Mill, bringing the fundraising total for the last eight months to at least £9,789. The Christmas Bazaar, along with the sale of seasonal cookbooks and Christmas cards, raised £2,043 and Paula and John Orton's Christmas drop-in event added a further £204. Valley Voice raised £360 from carol singing, including a £75 donation from Rockingham Castle, and Del's Souper Quiz on 8 February raised £324.

Middleton's Chris Spitteler has launched a new business Magnolia, offering garden, decorating and maintenance services.




Chris, a former professional chef, has decided to swap the hot kitchen for a new career where he can enjoy the outdoors and some fresh air!
