Cottingham Methodist Church

The first Methodist Church in Cottingham opened in 1808 and a second larger church, with a gallery for the growing congregation, was built alongside in 1878. But sadly, as many of you may know, the buildings have had to be closed.

Rev Andrew Farrington, Superintendent Minister for Kettering & Corby Methodist Circuit, said: "It is with sadness that I report that Cottingham Methodist Church will no longer be used for worship or by the community.

"Over the years, the Methodist premises have welcomed generations of families at worship. They have helped mark life's journeys of baptism, marriage, and death. Fayres and concerts, fellowships and meetings have been held, each helping to sustain the village community.

"However, the challenge of maintaining premises, keeping pace with legislation and other regulations has become increasingly difficult to achieve and sustain. After some period of prayerful consideration, the decision has been taken to designate the buildings as 'mission served'.

"Although there is no longer a designated Methodist building, continuing pastoral care is being offered to the church membership. Weekly worship and fellowship is planned at the nearest Methodist Church in Kingswood, Corby, and St Mary Magdalene CofE Church continues to be a place of Christian worship and welcome in the village. A member of the Methodist ministry team is also a governor at Cottingham CofE Primary School.

"I wish to thank everyone who has helped sustain the life of the Methodist Church at Cottingham. It is a privilege to

serve in this community. I look forward to meeting with you at village events."

The family of worshippers from Cottingham Methodist Church placed a bunch of golden roses with the above note on the door of the Church. They also provided the following farewell message: "After over 200 years of service and worship, and despite our best efforts, our beloved Methodist Church has been closed. We would like to thank all of you who, over the years, have supported us and joined us in worship and friendship."



Decision time for Cottingham Neighbourhood Plan

Referendum vote – 17 February, 7am to 10pm, Village Hall Annex

Most people who have ever served as a Parish Councillor will tell you how frustrating it is to be unable, by law, to exert any real influence on decisions about residential and commercial development in their parishes. Although Parish Councils are 'statutory consultees', they have no powers to approve or reject planning applications – they can only comment on them, and local planning authorities are under no obligation to take such comments into consideration.



But since 2011, the law has allowed communities to exert meaningful control and influence over planning decisions by formulating a Neighbourhood Plan. This is a complex process of research, verification, consultation and examination which culminates in a vote by residents to either adopt or reject the Plan.

Over the last three years, Cottingham Parish Council, with considerable assistance and input from several residents, has developed a Neighbourhood Plan for Cottingham. The Plan has passed through all the stages described above and Cottingham residents are now being asked to vote in a referendum on **Thursday 17 February**, from 7am to 10pm in the Village Hall Annex.

The Plan sets out various policies and stipulations covering housing developments, 'infill' housing (e.g. single dwellings on cleared or unused plots, or conversion of redundant buildings), and the protection and preservation of the village's environment and amenities. For example, only one entirely new housing development would be permitted within the village before 2031. The site selected for this, following last year's consultation with Cottingham residents, would be Hill Farm on Rockingham Road, for a maximum of 10 houses, predominantly affordable homes for local people, of a design that is sympathetic to the character of the village.

Voting in the referendum to adopt the Neighbourhood Plan for Cottingham is a one time opportunity to affect decisions that will shape and protect our community. North Northants Council would be legally required to factor in the Plan's policies when considering all applications for development within Cottingham. If the Plan isn't adopted by a majority vote, it will cease to exist.

If there's no Plan, there's no say.

Police priorities and update

Following residents' feedback, the Corby Neighbourhood Policing Team has announced the following top three priority issues for the area in the coming months: (1) road safety (2) drug dealing and misuse, and (3) antisocial behaviour involving motorcycles.



The team has seen a rise in the theft of keyless entry cars by thieves scanning the keys remotely. The Police recommend that you keep your keys away from window sills and outside doors, and ideally keep them in a safe, secure Faraday pouch. There has also been a rise in theft of tools from vans. The Police recommend removing tools from your van at night but, if this isn't possible, consider installing a secondary PIR alarm system on the back doors, and make sure your tools are clearly marked so you can identify them (not just with your initials). In memory

We have bid farewell to three of our much loved villagers over recent weeks – Edna White, Chris Owen and John Muir.

Edna White sadly passed away aged 98 on New Year's Eve, at home surrounded by family. She had lived in Cottingham all her married life, for over 80 years, and had made many friends here. After meeting Reginald White, who lived in the old Manor House that used to stand on the site of the Spread Eagle car park, she moved into a cottage in School Lane and later to Bancroft Road. Edna went on to have four children – Sylvia, David, Jean and Graham. She will be fondly remembered.

One of Cottingham's most colourful characters, **Chris Owen**, passed away on 8 January, aged 78, doing what he loved – pottering in the shed and garden of his home at the former Post Office on Church Street, where Chris and Sue moved in 1977. Here, they raised their two children, Oliver and Imogen, and also ran their internationally successful business 'Museum Casts'.

Chris was an active member of the local community. He served on Cottingham Parish Council, devised the East Carlton Spring Festival through Nene Arts, which he founded, and set up the New Kettering Film Society. Chris regularly used his extensive

historical and environmental knowledge to support the villages in many ways, including the development of Cottingham's Parish Plan and Conservation Area Appraisal, helping to build the case against unwelcome development in the village, and providing fascinating displays for village events, many of which he heralded in with gusto, decked out in his typically flamboyant town crier outfit. And not forgetting, of course, his annual stint as innkeeper for the village Nativity Walk!

He was on many committees including LEADER, and was instrumental in establishing and finding funding for the Village Shop. He also helped save The Dale for the village and, right up to the end, Chris could be found monitoring the flora in the Dale, including some rare species that are to be found there. The two village signs that Chris designed and produced for the Millennium will serve as a lasting memorial. He has been laid to rest in Cottingham Churchyard, and we will always remember him with a smile.

Corby Pole Fair

The Pole Fair is a unique tradition that takes place in Corby every 20 years. Fairs have taken place in Corby as far back as



1226 when Henry III granted the right to hold two annual fairs and markets, and the first documented Pole Fair took place in 1862.

It's thought the tradition could relate to the time when the Danes settled in Corby, and men committing minor offences were made to 'ride the stang' – being carried through the streets astride an ash pole or stang – while villagers threw insults and missiles at them!

Corby will be reliving many of the old traditions, including a dawn parade, reading of the town's Royal Charter at the entrances to Corby village, and a greasy pole competition.
