## Best footy forward!

Football has been given a further boost in the villages with the formation of a Cottingham youth football team (for ages 16 and over) and an under 7s team (for ages 5 to 7). The new teams are the brainchild of 16 year old Evan Burbidge of Berryfield Road, who has also successfully secured sponsorship from the Spread Eagle for the youth team and from the Red Lion for the under 7s. The village 'Ramblers' have also given Evan some money towards set up costs.

Spread Eagle landlord Sam Perkins, who started playing for the original Cottingham FC when he was nine years old and whose father captained Cottingham's lower junior cup winning team in 1949, will be coaching the new youth team. And interest in the under 7s team has been so great that the Red Lion is busy holding a number of fundraising activities to raise money for a second kit!

Once the new pitch, goalposts and protective netting are in place, both teams will be playing their matches on the Berryfield Road recreation field. ## £7,500 for village youth

## Village shop update - the Hub and Trumpet

Work is progressing on the shop and is expected to be finished by the end of the month. When the shell of the shop is ready, Community Rocks, the charity that's running the project, intends to hold an open day/evening when everyone will be welcome to come in, have a look around and find out more about the plans for the shop and cafe.

A detailed grant application is in progress which, if successful, will meet part of the set-up costs for the project. The opening date will depend to some extent on how long this process takes but is scheduled for Autumn 2010.

The chosen name for the premises is the 'Hub and Trumpet' which reflects the intention that it is to once more become a central hub of the village, where goods can be bought and sold and where people can meet to enjoy good coffee, good food and some lively conversation.

## Rural Police update

I have recently had a few concerns raised in relation to inconsiderate parking in the following areas.



- Rockingham Road - cars parking on the grass verge, right hand side heading out of the village. On the occasions when the cars are half on and half off the verge, this causes a hazard to vehicles entering and leaving the village.
- Welland View and Blind Lane - vehicles parking near to junctions and on pathways.
- Outside the school during drop off and collection times.

Please be considerate to your neighbours when parking your vehicles, being mindful of junctions and drivers requiring clear views.

Could I also ask that you are extra observant with persons knocking your door trying to sell items, or persons just acting suspiciously near to your neighbours' homes. A lady in the village was visited by three males recently who gained entry to her home. She is a little shaken but not hurt. We have also had an incident recently where a dog has worried sheep. Please could I ask dog walkers to take care when walking their dogs near to fields containing sheep.

## Beer, buses and big screen TVs!

Mark Shirley (from Rockingham Forest Cider, Middleton) takes a look back at this year's Welland Valley Beer Festival

Beer, buses, and big screen TVs were the theme of this year's Welland Valley Beer Festival, with 11 pubs offering 170 real ales and ciders along with fine food and entertainment. The unseasonably fine weather helped make it a great weekend for locals and visitors alike, and only the England football team failed to raise their game. Thankfully, there was plenty of beer left to drown our sorrows at full time!

Saturday featured a fleet of vintage buses ferrying revellers between the pubs. For those of us old enough to remember these lovingly restored vehicles first time around, the bus rides were a real nostalgia trip and a big part of what makes the Welland Valley Beer Festival so special. Travelling on a packed Routemaster 'London' bus down the leafy lanes of the Welland Valley is highly sociable, so much so that people travel from far and wide to experience the unique atmosphere of the day.

Friday evening saw live music at all three of our local pubs. Starting our evening at the top of the hill, enjoying the fine view down the valley from the decking at the rear of the Royal George, we had our first opportunity to try this year's festival special ale, cheekily named 'Welland'Owd', and brewed by Kettering's Potbelly Brewery. It proved to be a delicious golden ale, perfect for summer drinking.

Then onwards to the Spread Eagle where an extensive range of ales and ciders were being served from the cool of the cellar. We took advantage of the late evening sunshine on the patio in front of the pub, enjoying a couple of ciders from award-winning Welsh producer Gwynt-Y-Ddraig. Suitably refreshed we took the scenic route to Middleton along the Jurassic Way footpath and our friends were mightily impressed when a Red Kite tracked our progress down the Valley!



The Red Lion was our final destination for Friday and an opportunity to try a few more ciders, including a rare and devilishly strong one from Hucknall in Nottinghamshire. Straw bales and country music set the scene, and the party atmosphere meant we stayed a little longer than absolutely necessary!

Saturday was a day for travelling with the crowds who'd by now descended on the Valley. Pubs were visited and many beers were drunk. If you missed it this year, be sure not to miss the bus in 2011 when the Welland Valley Beer Festival promises to be even bigger and better. If you did enjoy this year's festival, do remember, a pub is for life, not just a warm summer's day in June. The licensees of our three village pubs are doing a fantastic job throughout the year. Please support them whenever you can.
