Villagers Join Forces in face of Shop Closure

Villagers are rallying together following the recent closure of the village shop and post office.

The shop is an invaluable resource for villagers in Cottingham, Middleton and



East Carlton, and Cottingham Parish Council Clerk, Peter Taylor, is leading a cross-village working party that is looking to find a solution to the closure as soon as possible.

The working party, which includes representatives from the Post Office, Northants ACRE and local councillor Bob Rutt, is in active liaison with the shop's current proprietor. A number of possible solutions to the closure have been discussed, including re-opening the shop on a temporary 'village co-operative' basis, but no action can really be taken until the intentions of the current proprietor are made known. However, the good news is that there has been a lot of interest shown in taking over the shop and post office, not only from the surrounding area, but nationally as well.

An official notice for the vacancy of sub-postmaster has been advertised (see the Parish Council notice boards) and anyone who'd like to register their interest should call Post Office Agency Recruitment on **0845 6016260.** Anyone interested in taking over the shop should contact **Peter Taylor** on **01536 262984** (daytime) or **01536 761752** (evenings).

Free Shopping and Bread Delivery



Whilst the shop is closed, villagers **Rachel Hudson** and **Denise McElwain** have offered to provide a free shopping service for villagers in Cottingham and Middleton who are unable to get to the shops themselves. Crime Report

There were 10 crimes reported in Cottingham during December and January, most of which (6) were thefts, attempted thefts or petty damage to parked motor vehicles. There was also one garage break-in and an attempted house burglary.

Planning and Development

Installation of Mobile Home - Land at top of Corby Road

Corby Borough Council's planning department has refused the planning application for the installation of a mobile home on land at the top of Corby Road on the basis that it would be 'beyond any established settlement and would not be within an area allocated for development'. Sustainability issues were also cited.

The Northamptonshire County Council/Atkins partnership will also be pursuing the reinstatement of the grass verge between the current unauthorised access and the road.

Land to rear of Cottingham Hall

The outline planning application that had been submitted for the proposed development of 90 homes on land to the rear of Cottingham Hall has not yet been registered by Corby Borough Council but has been returned to the applicant with a request for more information.

Village Design Statement

Cottingham Parish Council is currently considering the development of a Village Design Statement. This would describe the visual character of the village and demonstrate how local character and distinctiveness can be protected and enhanced in any new developments or renovations.

In Memory...

Mabel Adams, 1906 to 2005

Mabel married her husband Eric in 1928 and together ran the Bluebirds Coaches business (pictured right) from premises next to the Red Lion in Middleton. They sold the business in 1955 and then ran a service station and café in Wilbarston before retiring seven years later.

Mabel loved travelling -Spain and Tenerife being particular favourites - as well as cooking and joining Mrs Mabel Adams sadly died in Kettering Hospital last December at the age of 99.

Mabel had lived in Middleton for some 70 years and was a keen and active member of the local community, including the local Women's Institute where she won many awards for her glove-making and knitting skills.

She was born in Darlington in 1906 and was brought up by her grandmother after being orphaned at the age of four. She trained as a cook/housekeeper at Walworth Castle before being poached by Captain Lucas and his wife who brought her to Bury House when she was 19 years old.

Mrs Ethel Jackson sadly passed away on December 3rd, 20 days short of her 97th birthday.

She had been widowed for 25 years and in recent years had suffered ill health. During her working life she spent many years at the village factory of Wallis and Linnell as a sewing machinist.
