Crafty Monkeys!

A brand new craft club is starting up locally for pre-school children. 'Crafty Monkeys' is a non-profit-making venture being organised and run by two local mums. Its aim is to allow young children the freedom and opportunity to express their creative ideas in a fun and safe environment. There will be at least six different activities including one main focus for each week and the children will be able to take home everything they make.

The club will meet every Tuesday during term time, from 1.45pm to 2.45pm, at Drayton Village Hall. The cost is £18 for a 6-week term, payable in advance, to include a drink and cake for each child. All children will need to be accompanied by a responsible adult.

The club launches on **Tuesday 20 April**, with the children making dragons to celebrate St George's Day. During April and May, the children will also be decorating cakes, making clay animals, saltdough magnets, daffodil bunches and blossom lanterns.

Parish Councils - budgets & news

The budgets have now been set for Middleton and Cottingham Parish Councils for the 2010/11 financial year. The precept for Cottingham has increased by 3% this year, from £15,032 to £15,483. This is to account for inflation since 2007/8 when the precept was last increased.

The precept for Middleton has reduced this year to £3,888, as the previous £1,000 a year provision for the new Cottingham and Middleton community hall has not been included for 2010/11.

Middleton Parish Council's solicitor is currently liaising with Corby Borough Council regarding the conditions of the land lease for the new community hall. Commentary is provided by volunteers through special receivers that can be obtained free of charge at the club shop and carers accompanying a registered blind person can enter the ground free of charge, so it's two for the price of one!

Rural Police Update

Welcome to our new Police Community Support Officers (PCSOs) **Mark Tooley** and **Nathan Murray**. Mark, who is our main police contact for Cottingham and Middleton, has been a PCSO for over four years, working with the community on the Kingswood Estate in Corby. Nathan is new to the role and joined the team in September last year.

You may have seen Mark and Nathan out and about in the villages, and a member of the Rural Safer Community Team (SCT) also visits the Village Hall Annex once a month on a Tuesday afternoon. Come along to meet them for a chat or to talk through any issues you may have. Doorstep crime

The SCT would like to remind villagers to be on their guard against 'doorstep crime', involving unlicensed peddlers selling household goods door-to-door. Unfortunately, these visits sometimes act as a mask for burglaries.

To protect yourself and your home, if a salesman knocks on your door ask to see their ID and their Peddler's Certificate, issued by the local council. If you are in any way suspicious, contact the local Police straight away on their new number 03000 111 222 (or 999 for emergencies) and, if you see a vehicle, take down the registration number.

Crime Report

There was a spate of burglaries over a single night just before Christmas in Church Street, Cottingham. No crimes have been reported in the villages so far this year.

Dog fouling

Middleton Parish Council has asked the SCT to assist with its campaign to tackle dog fouling in the village, which has again become a problem caused by a small number of offenders.

Fly tipping

There has been a bad spell of fly tipping in Middleton, particularly on the old A427 (Middleton Lane). A group of volunteers has cleared the rubbish for collection by Corby Borough Council and the sites will be under camera surveillance in a few weeks time. Middleton Parish Council Chairman Dryden Phillipson is writing to our MP to press the Home Office for fly tipping to be treated as a reportable and arrestable crime, as currently incidents do not get included in the Parish's crime figures.

New Parish Councillors

Welcome to **Alan Davies** (49) of Rockingham Road who has filled the casual vacancy on Cottingham Parish Council. Prior to moving to the village in 2004, Alan was a school governor and an active member of his local Lion's Club. He says: "I am a committed supporter of village life and the need for the communities to protect and develop this, as well as being able to celebrate some more of the achievements of the smaller communities."

Welcome also to **Sarah Brant** who has joined Middleton Parish Council. Sarah moved to Main Street in 2004 and lives with her husband, osteopath Sam Ryall. Let it Be!

'Let it Be' – the words of one of The Beatles' most beautiful songs floats in the evening air over Corby Road, sung by the enthusiastic members of Cottingham and Middleton's new community choir.

The words also sum up how the choir came into being. When a merry posse of ladies at the



monthly dining (and wining) club Sweets held an impromptu singalong (What shall we do with the drunken sailor?), they enjoyed it so much, they wanted to keep on singing!

The result, said key conspirator Kath Vargerson, was a more sober conversation about how it might work and who might direct it musically. The answer to the second question lives in Middleton - Debbie Smith, a music teacher who was delighted to take on the challenge. Let It Be!

The choir currently has around 30 members and rehearsals take place every Tuesday, from 7.30pm to 9pm at the Methodist Hall on Corby Road, Cottingham. Subs are just £1 a week and it's the best value workout you can have for a quid. Singing is not only good, sociable fun, it's also great exercise, good for posture and breathing, and mentally stimulating too.

Adults (aged 16+) of all abilities are welcome to come along — don't worry that you may have missed a few weeks. While women are in the majority, there is a healthy male section (and thanks to vocal range deciding who sits where, all the boys get to huddle together).

Kath, who lives in Middleton, says anyone can join the choir and enjoy singing straight away. She admitted to no previous choral convictions: "We just thought it would be a really good thing for the community to come together to do. And we hope that if we get good enough we might be able to enter competitions or put on shows."

A suggestion was floated that, to bump up the male contingent in the choir, a target of singing during the Welland Valley Beer Festival might be a good one to aim for.

Before that though, there's a lot of practice to do and a lot of enjoyment to be had. And there's one important task, to think of a name for the choir. Debbie Smith is keen to say you don't need to be able to read music or anything fancy like that. "We thought we would just test the waters to begin with," said Debbie, "but the response has been fantastic - phenomenal, really. They're all so enthusiastic and are already making a wonderful sound."

The choir is also on the lookout for a pianist or keyboard player to accompany the singers at rehearsals. You don't need to be Liberace, just be able to tickle the keys a little to give the choir something to sing along to.
